- Colorblindness



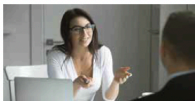

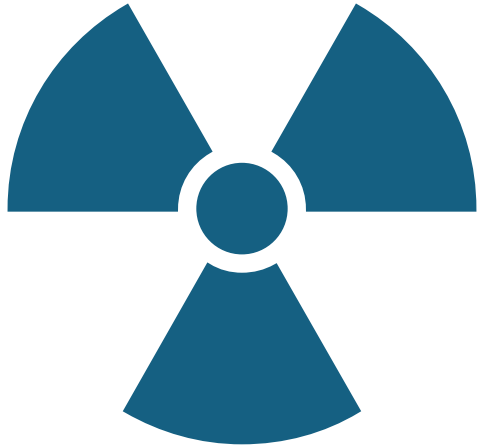

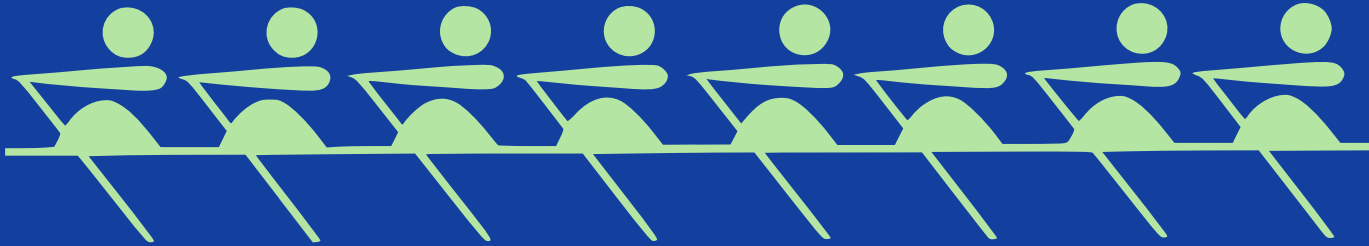

Dear Colleague: We write to make you aware of the Justice Department and Department of Education's ongoing efforts to address barriers that prevent people with disabilities from participating in online services, programs, and activities that colleges, universities, and other postsecondary institutions make available to students and the public.

In May 2022, OCR proactively launched 100 compliance reviews regarding digital accessibility. The reviews look at digital accessibility in public- and student-facing websites and educational platforms maintained by public and private colleges, universities, and other postsecondary institutions, as well as State departments of education, school districts, charter schools, and public libraries.

What is EIR?



Electronic and information resources (EIR)--Includes information technology and any equipment or interconnected system or subsystem of equipment used to create, convert, duplicate, store, or deliver data or information. EIR includes telecommunications products (such as telephones), information kiosks and transaction machines, web sites, multimedia, and office equipment such as copiers and fax machines. The term does not include any equipment that contains embedded information technology that is used as an integral part of the product, but the principal function of which is not the acquisition, storage, manipulation, management, movement, control, display, switching, interchange, transmission, or reception of data or information. For example, thermostats or temperature control devices, and medical equipment that contain information technology that is integral to its operation, are not information technology. If the embedded information technology has an externally available web or computer interface, that interface is considered EIR. Other terms such as, but not limited to, Information and Communications Technology (ICT), Information Technology (IT), Electronic Information Technology (EIT), etc. can be considered interchangeable terms with EIR for purposes of applicability or compliance with this chapter.

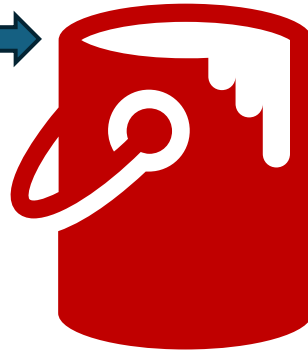

Hardware

Hardware: A tangible device, piece of equipment, or physical component of ICT, such as telephones, computers, multifunction copy machines, or keyboards.



Vendor Services

- Customizing webpages / portals
- Online platforms – Is there an on-line component to the deliverable?
- Electronic Communications – Emails? PDFs?
- Marketing services – social media posts? Emails?
- Videos

RULE §213.41

EIR Accessibility Policy and Coordinator

-
- (a) The department shall designate and maintain a person responsible for statewide accessibility initiatives.
- (b) Pursuant to 1 Texas Administrative Code §206.74, each institution of higher education shall publish a current accessibility policy which includes the standards and specifications of this chapter.
- (c) Each institution of higher education's accessibility policy shall require an institutionally-approved plan by which EIR will be brought into and maintained in compliance with the Technical Accessibility Standards and Specifications of this chapter. The plan shall include a process for corrective actions to remediate non-compliant items.
- (d) The head of each institution of higher education shall designate an EIR Accessibility Coordinator who shall be organizationally placed to facilitate institution-wide EIR accessibility compliance and practices in support of in support of their internal accessibility policy. The institution's designation must contain the individual's name and other information in the format prescribed by the department.

What does the law require?



The 2 laws most commonly referenced

- The Americans with Disabilities Act
 - Title I – Employment
 - Title II – State and Local Government Activities
 - Title III – Public Accommodations
 - Title IV – Telecommunications
 - With references to the Telecommunications Act, the Fair Housing Act, Air Carrier Access Act, Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act, National Voter Registration Act, Civil Rights of Institutionalized Persons Act, The Rehabilitation Act – and others.

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)

Applies to all federal/state agencies and places that require public accommodation.

- Federal Agencies, and all those receiving federal funds
- State Agencies, including schools
- Restaurants
- Hotels/Motels
- Shops
- Movie Theaters
- Private Schools (including housing)
- Doctors' Offices and Private Hospitals
- Day Care Centers
- Gyms
- Organizations Offering Courses or Examinations related to Applications, Licensing, Certifications, or Credentialing for Professional or Trade Purposes
- Privately Operated Transit and
- Commercial Facilities



Texas Current Requirement

Texas Administrative Code 206 - Websites

All new or changed web pages must comply with the standards referenced in US Section 508 Appendix C Chapter 7, 701.20 (**WCAG 2.0 Level AA** excluding Guideline 1.2 Time Based Media).

Texas Administrative Code 213 – Electronic and Information Resources

Each institution of higher education shall comply with the following standards referenced in Section 508 Appendix C: (1) Chapter 7, 702.10 (**WCAG 2.0 Level AA** excluding Guideline 1.2 Time Based Media).



New DOJ Rule

The rule changes the standard from WCAG 2.0 AA to WCAG 2.1 AA.

This puts TX schools under a “must follow the most restrictive rule” scenario.

Those without a stricter rule may be able to take advantage of some areas of the DOJ rule that Texas can't at the moment.



New DOJ Rule

Adds Subpart H to Sec 508 – websites and mobile apps

#1 Exceptions (not available to Texas agencies):

Web content that meets all 4 of these criteria do not need to meet 2.1 AA

- a) Created before the date of the rule, and**
- b) Kept only for reference, research, recordkeeping, and**
- c) Content is kept in a special area for archived content, and**
- d) The content has not been changed since it was archived**



New DOJ Rule

Adds Subpart H to Sec 508 – websites and mobile apps

#2 Pre-existing electronic documents (not available to Texas agencies):

- a) The documents are word processing, presentation, PDF, or spreadsheet files; **AND**
- b) They were available on the state or local government's website or mobile app **before** the date the state or local government must comply with this rule; **AND**
- c) Not currently in use



New DOJ Rule

Adds Subpart H to Sec 508 – websites and mobile apps

#3 Content posted by a third party where the third party is not posting due to contractual, licensing, or other arrangements with a public entity.

Example: a third party posting a message board hosted by the institution.

Example: People commenting on a Social Media Post



New DOJ Rule

Adds Subpart H to Sec 508 – websites and mobile apps

#4 Individualized documents that are password-protected. {Not available to TX agencies.}

- Documents that meet **all three** of the following points do not need to meet WCAG 2.1, Level AA:
 - The documents are word processing, presentation, PDF, or spreadsheet files, **AND**
 - The documents are about a specific person, property, or account, **AND**
 - The documents are password-protected or otherwise secured.

New DOJ Rule

Adds Subpart H to Sec 508 – websites and mobile apps

#5 Pre-existing Social Media Posts

- Applicable to posts made by the institution prior to the Rule's effective date (June 2026).
- Note, currently, the posts are already required to meet WCAG 2.0AA.



New DOJ Rule

Adds Subpart H to Sec 508 – websites and mobile apps

#6 Use of Conforming Alternate Versions

State and local governments are allowed to use conforming alternate versions only when there is a technical or legal limitation that prevents inaccessible web content or mobile apps from being made accessible.



TAC 213.38 Procurements

(b) For the procurement of EIR made directly by an institution of higher education or through the department's commodity procurement contracts for which the solicitation is issued on or after April 18, 2020, the institution shall require a vendor to provide accessibility information for the purchased products or services, where applicable, through one of the following methods:

- A URL to a VPAT
- Other documents that provide credible evidence of accessibility conformance
- A URL that where a VPAT can be requested



Federal requirement

- **Accessibility Conformance Report (ACR)** - A written ACR for each ICT item, based on the product's [Voluntary Product Accessibility Template \(TM\)](#)TM. To be considered for award, the ACR must be complete, and submitted according to the instructions.



TAC 213.38 Procurements - continued

(c) An institution of higher education shall implement a procurement accessibility policy, and supporting business processes and contract terms, for making procurement decisions. The institution of higher education shall monitor the procurement processes and contracts for accessibility compliance.

(d) This subchapter applies to EIR developed, procured, or materially changed by an institution of higher education, or developed, procured, or materially changed by a contractor under a contract with an institution of higher education



What is a VPAT?

Voluntary Product Accessibility Template[©] published by ITIC.ORG.

The VPAT template lists the WCAG criteria.

The vendor indicates if each criteria is supported or not.

ACCESS BY INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES:

Bidder represents and warrants under both this bid and any contract or agreement between Bidder and the University that results from this Invitation to Bid ("EIR Accessibility Warranty") that the electronic and information resources and all associated information, documentation, and support that Bidder provides or offers to provide to the University under this bid or any resulting contract or agreement (collectively, the "EIRs") comply with the applicable requirements set forth in Title 1, Chapter 213 of the Texas Administrative Code and Title 1, Chapter 206, Rule §206.70 of the Texas Administrative Code (as authorized by Chapter 2054, Subchapter M of the Texas Government Code.) To the extent successful Bidder becomes aware that the EIRs, or any portion thereof, do not comply with the EIR Accessibility Warranty, then Bidder represents and warrants that it will, at no cost to University, either (1) perform all necessary remediation to make the EIRs satisfy the EIR Accessibility Warranty or (2) replace the EIRs with new EIRs that satisfy the EIR Accessibility Warranty. In the event that Bidder is unable to do so, then the University may reject Bidder's bid and/or terminate any contract or agreement between Bidder and the University resulting from this IFB and Bidder will refund to the University all amounts the University has paid under any contract or agreement resulting from this IFB within thirty (30) days after the termination date.

Procurement Partners

Procurement Professionals partner with requesters.

Procurement partners with Legal Affairs and OIT.

Build your partnership with the EIRAC!



Who does what?

Buyer

Secure VPAT from vendors.

Ensure EIRAC approval has been provided prior to purchase.

Work to ensure vendor meets PO requirements.

EIRAC

Score VPAT; if necessary, process exception forms.

Communicate with Buyers regarding status of requests.

Report to Procurement if a contract/deliverable fails.



EIR Accessibility Rules – more than only Purchase Orders

The rules apply to EIR:

- That is free
- That is put on a ProCard
- That is reimbursed
- That is created by the institution
- That is procured
- That is part of a revenue generating agreement.



Is the resource pre-approved?

If we assess a resource and it has an accessibility score of A, it is added as pre-approved.

If the resource is not pre-approved, a ticket for an assessment is required from the requester.

- Name and Description of Resource
- Purpose
- Users
- Cost
- Procurement Method
- Vendor

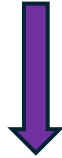

Small Dollar Purchase Orders

Requesting department is responsible for securing EIR accessibility approval.



If Buyers issue small dollar POs, they verify EIRAC approval is attached or delay dispatching.



If small dollar POs automatically dispatched, add EIRAC to the approval workflow.

Texas Requirements for EAE

- (4) An approved exception for a significant difficulty or expense under Texas Government Code §2054.460 shall include the following:
 - (A) a date of expiration or duration of the exception;
 - (B) a plan for alternate means of access for persons with disabilities;
 - (C) justification for the exception including technical barriers, cost of remediation, fiscal impact for bringing the EIR into compliance, and other identified risks; and
 - (D) documentation of how the institution of higher education considered alternative solutions and all institution resources available to the program or program component for which the product is being developed, procured, maintained, or used. Examples may include, but are not limited to, institution budget, grants, and alternative vendor or product selections.



A Ticketing System

Requesting department is responsible for securing EIR accessibility approval.
